


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## who stands with you in the judgment?

ead the message of the first angel in Revelation 14:6, 7. Notice his solemn pronouncement, "The hour of his [God's] judgment is come." You have now completed the study of what the third angel said. For the first time you may realize a new concept in your relationship to God based on mutual trust and responsibility between you and your Maker. But such an understanding calls for decision, a decision between the traditional views of religion and worship, and Scripture; between the law of God and the regulations of men—yes, between the seal of God and the "mark of the beast." Your decision involves much. Friends, loved ones, your job, plans for the future—all may be affected. As important as these things are, you must also consider a far greater factor, "for we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ." 2 Corinthians 5:10. The decision you make goes with you into judgment.

When faced with the prospects of appearing in court, man customarily engages the services of an advocate or lawyer. The most important aspect in the relationship between defendant and advocate as they prepare the case for court is mutual trust and understanding. "We have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous." 1 John 2:1. Jesus stands willing to take our case and go with us into judgment. In our study now we will explore the mutual trust and understanding that we must experience with Christ as our day in court draws near.
