Tendai:	I think attitude is the most important thing.		

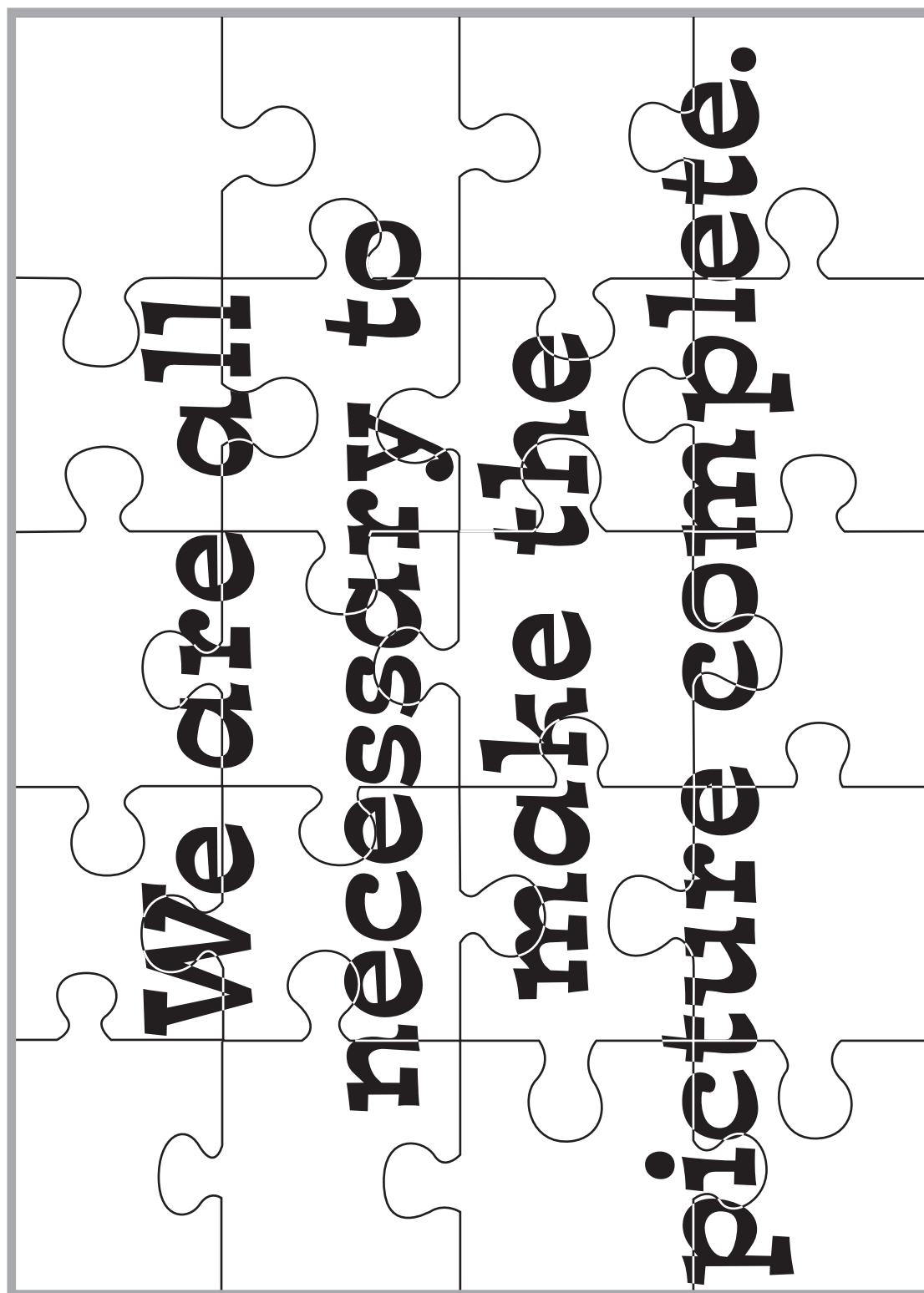
NET KIDS SCRIPT

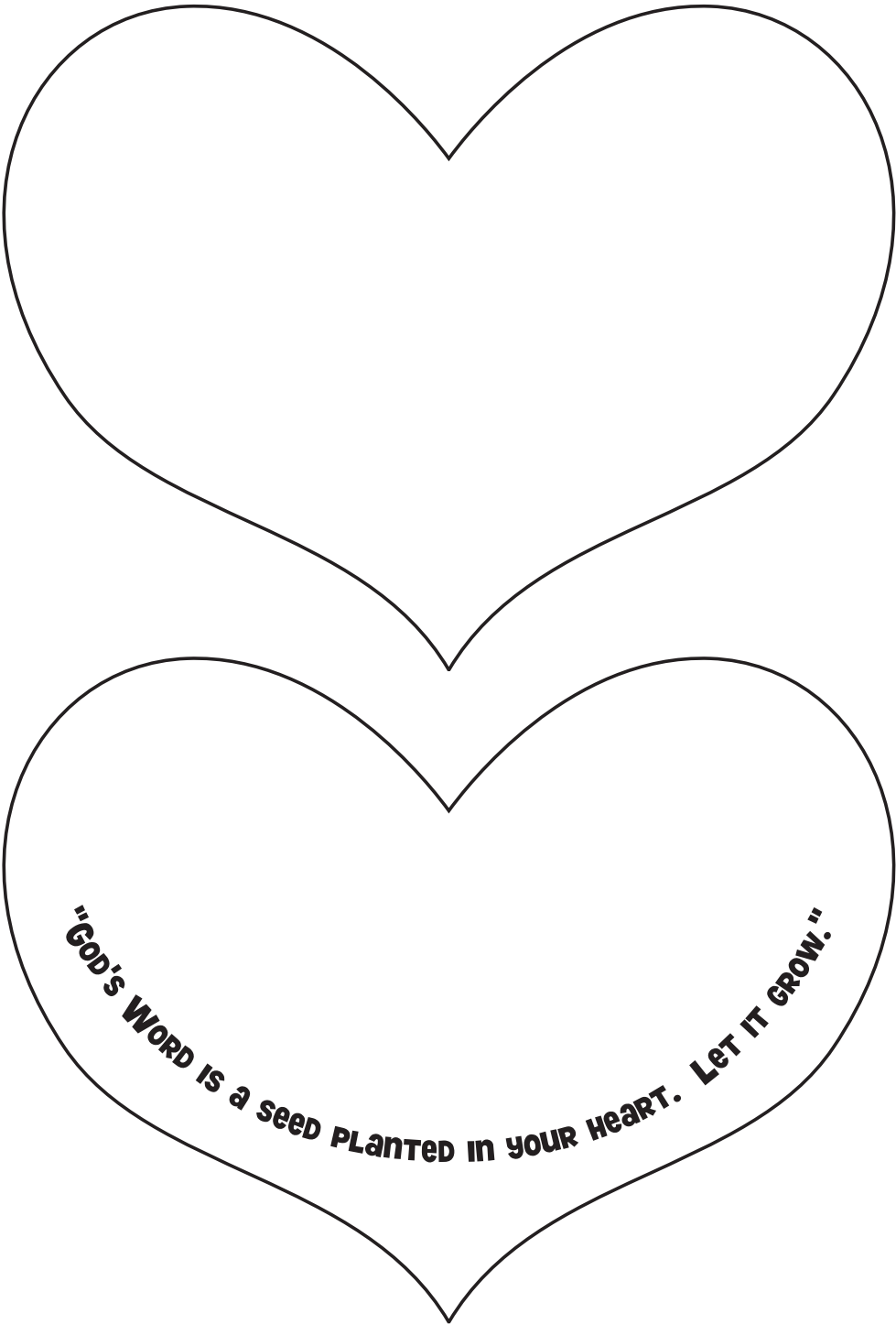
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NET KIDS SCRIPT
